
Different Types Of Online Bingo

Online bingo isn't just one game. Once you start exploring, you'll find a mix of formats, speeds, and prize styles depending on where you play.

Some feel just like the traditional bingo hall experience. Others are quicker, more interactive, and over before you've had time to get comfortable.

Here's a breakdown of the main types you'll come across on [UK bingo sites](#).

90-Ball Bingo

This is the classic and still the most popular version in the UK.

Each ticket has:

- 3 rows
- 9 columns
- 15 numbers in total

There are three chances to win in every game:

- One Line – complete any single row
- Two Lines – complete two rows
- Full House – mark off all 15 numbers

Because there are multiple prizes, games tend to last longer and feel more relaxed. It's the closest thing to the traditional bingo hall experience and a good place to start if you're new.

75-Ball Bingo

Originally from the US, but now widely available on UK sites.

Tickets use a different layout:

- 5x5 grid
- 24 numbers plus a free space in the centre
- Numbers arranged under B-I-N-G-O

Instead of just lines, 75-ball uses patterns to decide the winner.

These can include:

- Horizontal, vertical, or diagonal lines
- Shapes like crosses or diamonds
- More creative patterns depending on the game

It adds more variety and keeps things from feeling repetitive, especially if you play regularly.

80-Ball Bingo

80-ball bingo sits somewhere between 75-ball and 90-ball.

Cards are:

- 4x4 grid
- 16 numbers
- Usually colour-coded columns

Common prizes include:

- One line
- Two lines
- Full House

Games are quicker than 90-ball but still give you more structure than the faster formats. It's a good middle ground if you want something slightly faster without losing that traditional feel.

30-Ball Bingo

Also known as Speed Bingo, 30-ball bingo is the quickest version of the game you'll find. Cards have a tiny 3x3 grid with just nine numbers inside, and the first player to cover all numbers on their ticket wins. There's typically only one prize - the Full House - so it's very much all or nothing.

- 9 numbers

There's usually just one prize:

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- Full House

Games can be over in seconds, which makes it ideal for short sessions or playing between other games. There's no build-up here, just straight to the result.

50-Ball Bingo

50-ball bingo isn't as common, but it does appear on some sites.

It's another fast-paced option with:

- Smaller cards
- Fewer numbers
- Shorter rounds

It sits somewhere between 30-ball and 75-ball in terms of pace. Not essential, but worth trying if you want something a bit different.

Slingo

Slingo is where bingo starts to blend with slots.

Instead of waiting for numbers to be called, you spin reels to match numbers on your card. When numbers land, they're marked off automatically.

You'll also see features like:

- Wilds
- Multipliers
- Bonus rounds

It's more interactive than traditional bingo and tends to move much faster. If standard bingo feels a bit slow, **Slingo games** are usually the next step.

Coverall And Jackpot Games

Across most bingo formats, you'll also find special games with larger prizes.

These usually involve hitting a Full House within a set number of calls.

For example:

- Win within a certain number of calls and land a jackpot

- Miss that window, and you still get a standard prize

Some jackpots are fixed, while others grow over time. They're harder to hit, but they add an extra layer to regular games.

Which Type Of Bingo Should You Play?

Honestly, the best way to find your favourite is to try them all. Most online bingo sites let you play multiple variants, and many offer free or very low-cost rooms where you can get a feel for each type without spending much.

If you like a traditional experience with multiple chances to win, 90-ball is the way to go. If you want something more visual and pattern-based, give 75-ball a try. And if speed is your thing, 30-ball or 80-ball will keep you entertained without long waits.
